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## TROPICANA FIELD STADIUM INFORMATION



The seating is arranged with odd sections on the left field side, and even sections on the right field side. **100-Level** seating wraps around the entire field, broken at center field by the Batter's Eye Restaurant, and has loge boxes along the infield from foul pole to foul pole. **200-Level** seating are press boxes along the foul lines, broken by the press box behind home plate, with the luxury boxes directly behind and above them. **300-Level** seating wraps around the infield along the lines and also features the

**ibt\* Party Deck**, a small-capacity seating area above the left field outfield seats with separate concessions inside. Rows are lettered starting closest to home plate and rise as you move further away.

There are two sit-down restaurants: the **Center Field Brewhouse** and the **Batter's Eye Restaurant**. Center Field Brewhouse serves typical restaurant fare, while the Batter's Eye has a premium buffet and can accommodate group parties.

In addition to generic vendors, there are also concession stands for **Checkers**, **Outback Steakhouse** and **Papa John's Pizza**. Both Checkers and Outback Steakhouse are Tampa-Bay based establishments.

The **Cuestra-Rey Cigar Bar** is located across from the Batter's Eye Restaurant. They offer a large selection of cigars, and are founded here in Tampa Bay. It is the only indoor location at Tropicana Field where smoking is permitted.



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## 2010 BEEF O' BRADY'S BOWL ST. PETERSBURG **GAME MATCHUP**


The 2010 Beef 'O' Brady's Bowl St. Petersburg is not only an exciting matchup for the fans of Southern Miss and Louisville, but it also provides the every-day fan with the complete pageantry. Two exciting programs with rich tradition – both on their own campus and in a 28-game series against each other, impressive young coaches who share a common background and an offensive vs. defensive matchup that is one of the best in all of the college bowl games this year.



"The Louisville and Southern Miss matchup is a big win for college football fans," says Beef 'O' Brady's Bowl Executive Director Brett Dulaney. "These are two programs that have always played an exciting brand of football and the matchup features a defensive-minded Louisville team against a Southern Miss team that averages close to 40 points a game."

Larry Fedora, in his third year as head coach at Southern Miss, has his Golden Eagles ranked 15th in the nation in total offense with 458 yards per game. In addition to scoring 40 points in seven of its final eight games, Southern Miss has put at least 50 points on the board in each of its last two games heading into the bowl matchup with Louisville.

That trend will face a stifling challenge from Charlie Strong's Louisville Cardinals. Strong, a rookie head coach, has his Cardinals ranked 12th in the nation in defense. The Cardinals allow just 18 points a game and have two shutouts, including one over BIG EAST Champion



and BCS Bowl participant Connecticut.

In fact, each team has an impressive win over its respective conference champion, with Louisville knocking off UConn and Southern Miss boasts a win over Conference USA champ UCF.

The coaching matchup between Fedora and Strong provides yet another storyline as they were both assistant coaches at the University of Florida. Fedora worked his way to offensive





It is a great area with great weather and we have the opportunity to play a BIG EAST opponent. We are thrilled about being able to play another game."

coordinator for the Gators, prior to taking that same title at Oklahoma State, while Strong had several different stops in Gainesville, most recently as defensive coordinator directly prior to accepting the Louisville job. Strong has coached with Lou Holtz, Steve Spurrier and Urban Meyer in his impressive career.

Southern Miss and Louisville are hardly strangers on the football field with 28 previous meetings. While Southern Miss holds an 18-9-1 edge, the series has always provided exciting contests, including a game just last season in which Louisville won 25-23 on a 32-yard field goal with just 30 seconds remaining in the game.

Each coach is excited to have his team in St. Petersburg, seeing plenty of benefit for the respective programs.

"I'm very proud of this football team," said Strong. "I'm especially happy for our senior class to get to a bowl game and have the opportunity to play one more game. Our team has worked hard and dedicated themselves to earn a bowl game, and I'm so happy for them. We are pleased to represent the BIG EAST Conference against Southern Miss in this outstanding bowl and are looking forward to this outstanding opportunity."

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## BIG EAST CONFERENCE

The 2010-11 academic year is the 32nd in the history of The BIG EAST Conference as the unique consortium marches on competing at the highest level with integrity and sportsmanship.

The BIG EAST has gone through membership changes since its birth, but the 2010-11 year marks the conference's sixth straight with the same 16-member group, the nation's largest Division I-A conference.

The BIG EAST Conference's goals have always been the same. The outstanding performances of the student-athletes at BIG EAST schools are evidence of the league's proud tradition of success. The league has always been able to boast that many of its best students are also its best athletes. The 2009-10 year was no different.

Seven BIG EAST student-athletes were named NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship winners. Maya Moore, Connecticut's women's basketball standout, won the NCAA Honda-Broderick Award as the nation's top female student-athlete. She also was named the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-American of the Year for women's basketball. Moore was the fifth BIG EAST women's student-athlete to win the Honda-Broderick Award.

In the athletic arena, BIG EAST student-athletes again enjoyed success on the national stage. The Connecticut women's basketball team won its second straight national championship and its seventh overall crown. The Villanova women's cross country team also won the NCAA title. The Notre Dame women's soccer team reached the NCAA College Cup for the second straight year. The Syracuse women's lacrosse squad reached the Final Four.

On the men's side, West Virginia's basketball team became the BIG EAST's 16th team to reach the NCAA Final Four and win the conference's academic achievement award. The Notre Dame men's lacrosse team advanced to the NCAA championship game.

Individually, three BIG EAST student-athletes won NCAA titles. Cincinnati's Josh Schneider won the 50 freestyle in men's swimming. In track, Louisville's D'Ana McCarty repeated as the NCAA indoor winner in the weight throw. Louisville's Matt Hughes won the 3,000 steeplechase. Another Cardinal, Austen Childs, was the national runner-up in men's tennis singles.

BIG EAST football maintained its national profile as a competitively balanced group. Cincinnati won its second straight league championship in 2009 and compiled an undefeated regular

season. The Bearcats finished third in the final Bowl Championship Series standings. Six of the league's eight squads went to bowl games and helped the BIG EAST post a 4-2 bowl record. Rutgers, one of the bowl winners, also was recognized for having the nation's highest NCAA APR rating, which measures academic success.

The BIG EAST has continued to produce student-athletes who are at the forefront of athletic and academic achievement. In 2009-10, 22 BIG EAST players from 10 schools were chosen to their respective ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Teams. Over 400 student-athletes have earned academic all-America honors.

The BIG EAST became the nation's largest Division I-A conference in 2005-06 when five new members began competing. The new schools were: University of Cincinnati, DePaul University, University of Louisville, Marquette University and the University of South Florida.

BIG EAST institutions reside in nine of the nation's top 35 largest media markets, including New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Tampa, Pittsburgh, Hartford, Cincinnati and Milwaukee. With its newest members, BIG EAST markets contain almost one-fourth of all television households in the U.S.

Since opening its doors in 1979, the league has won 28 national championships in six different sports and 128 student-athletes have won individual national titles.

In 2003-04, Connecticut became the first school in NCAA history to win the men's and women's NCAA basketball titles in the same season. In '02-03, the BIG EAST became the first conference in NCAA history to win the men's and women's titles in the same year when the Syracuse men and the Connecticut women captured their respective national championships. In men's basketball, BIG EAST squads have won three of the last 12 NCAA championships. BIG EAST women's teams have taken seven of the last 11 NCAA titles.

Proactive movement has been a signature strategy for the conference that was born in 1979. The BIG EAST continually turns challenges into opportunities to become stronger.

In 2009-10, the BIG EAST added men's lacrosse to its growing list of sports, which increased its total to 24 sport championships. The BIG EAST became a reality on May 31, 1979, following a meeting of athletic directors from Providence College, St. John's, Georgetown and Syracuse universities. Seton Hall, Connecticut

and Boston College completed the original seven school alliance.

While the membership has both increased and changed, the focus of the BIG EAST has not wavered. The conference reflects a tradition of broad based programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity. Its student athletes own significantly high graduation rates and their record of scholastic achievement notably show a balance between intercollegiate athletics and academics.

Any successful organization has had the good fortune to have outstanding leadership. The BIG EAST primarily was the brainchild of Dave Gavitt, who was the conference's first Commissioner. Michael Tranghese, the league's first full-time employee, and for 11 years the associate to Gavitt, became Commissioner in 1990. In his first year, he administered the formation of The BIG EAST Football Conference.

In 2009-10, the BIG EAST had one significant change. Tranghese stepped down from his position on June 30, 2009. John Marinatto, who had served as senior associate commissioner, moved into the Commissioner's chair and continued to steer the conference on its path of success.

The league has long been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television. Those efforts have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST student athletes. The conference has enjoyed long-standing relationships with CBS, ESPN, Inc. and ABC.

BIG EAST men's basketball games are regular sellouts at campus and major public arenas, including the annual men's BIG EAST Championship in Madison Square Garden. The women's basketball championship has led all conferences in attendance for the past seven years. Attendance figures also are significant in soccer and baseball.

More than 575 BIG EAST student-athletes have earned all America recognition and dozens have won individual NCAA national championships. The BIG EAST has been well represented in U.S. or foreign national and Olympic teams. Several athletes earned gold medals.

The BIG EAST has its headquarters in Providence where the conference administers to more than 5,500 student-athletes.



## THE UNIVERSITY of **LOUISVILLE**



The University of Louisville attracts many of the nation's the best and brightest young minds to its friendly, park-like campus in the heart of Kentucky's largest city.

Since 2003, 34 UofL students have won Fulbright awards, more than any other Kentucky university. This success is based in part on the fact that UofL faculty not only are some of the best in their fields, but that they take a personal interest in students and push them to do their best too.

Students at UofL are presented a wide range of study options - more than 170 fields in 11 schools and colleges - with many nationally ranked programs among them. UofL's location in an area of more than a million people is also an asset, giving students many opportunities to apply the critical thinking skills they hone in the classroom to relevant, hands-on experiences in the community.

UofL students benefit from superb facilities, including a library system ranked among the top 100 research libraries in North America and one of the nation's top clean rooms, where work in bioengineering, nanotechnology and other high-demand fields occurs.

UofL is committed to building a nurturing and challenging intellectual

climate, a respect for diversity and a genuine understanding of how diversity enriches a vibrant metropolitan research university. One of the university's goals is to give every arts and sciences student the chance to study abroad at least once during his or her undergraduate career.

The university is also one of the fastest-growing research institutions in the nation, yielding many milestone discoveries.

UofL faculty conducted the world's first successful implantation of a fully implantable artificial heart, developed the world's first 100-percent effective cervical cancer vaccine, conducted the world's first FDA-approved clinical trial using adult cardiac stem cells to treat heart disease and completed the nation's first successful hand transplant.

In 2009, UofL and the Commonwealth of Kentucky announced the establishment of the Conn Center for Renewable Energy Research and Environmental Stewardship. And UofL's School of Public Health and Information Sciences received \$2.3 million to lead research in preparation for, prevention of and communication during pandemics.

UofL also stands out in community service. The university's curricular engagement, outreach and partnerships

recently earned it a Carnegie Community Engagement ranking, a designation held by fewer than 200 institutions nationwide. In one year alone, UofL students, faculty and staff contributed more than \$25.1 million to charitable organizations through volunteerism and direct donations.

Among the university's many outreach programs is the Signature Partnership, working with community organizations and businesses to improve the social, cultural, educational, health care and economic development services in a historically underserved area of Louisville.

UofL was environmentally minded long before "green" became a buzzword, cofounding the Partnership for a Green City several years ago with the city of Louisville and the local public school system to reduce waste, increase energy efficiency and improve the health and education of area children.

UofL is a major player in the downtown arts scene, too, helping bring fine arts programming to Louisville to create a more vibrant city center. The Cressman Center for the Visual Arts is just one result of this effort. It features a glass hot shop, coldworking, metal and woodworking studios and three galleries open daily to the public.

But the greatest way in which UofL is making its mark is through the contributions its students make to society. They graduate to become valuable citizens such as current Republican Leader and U.S. Sen. Mitch McConnell; U.S. Sen. and recent presidential candidate Christopher Dodd; Sirius/XM Radio personality Bob Edwards; best-selling author Sue Grafton; and Sharon Darling, founder and president of the National Center for Family Literacy.

They truly help demonstrate that UofL's slogan, "It's Happening Here," isn't just a marketing tagline. It's a way of life.



## LOUISVILLE **PRESIDENT**



JAMES RAMSEY

As University of Louisville President James Ramsey has commented on many occasions, "The University of Louisville is an institution with a great history and tradition. Our job is to build on that history and tradition going forward."

There is no question that during Dr. Ramsey's eight-year tenure the University of Louisville is a very changed institution. Under Dr. Ramsey's leadership the quality of UofL's freshman class has improved each year, with an average ACT score today for incoming freshmen of 24.5, well above the national average of 21.2 and the state average of 20.8. What's more, students coming to the University of Louisville are having greater success than ever.

Graduation rates over the last six years have improved more than 33%. UofL students continue to receive a significant share of the nation's most prestigious academic honors, including 14 Fulbright scholarships in 2010, UofL's highest total ever and a number matching many of the nation's premier universities. During the last seven years, the university's research programs have continued to grow - for the seven-year period 2001-2008, UofL ranked second among all institutions in National Institutes of Health (NIH) funding. Today the University of Louisville's dental school ranks 14th nationally among all institutions in funding; new drugs are in various phases of clinical trials; new clinical procedures are improving health care for people of our community and state; UofL's Rapid Prototyping Lab in the Speed School of Engineering is coming up with new advanced manufacturing systems to make

Kentucky manufacturers more competitive. The Conn Center for Renewable Energy Research and Environmental Stewardship, launched in 2009 with a \$21 million gift from Henry and Rebecca Conn, will lead Kentucky's efforts in renewable energy.

Dr. Ramsey's tenure has included a significant focus on the community of which the university is a part. The University of Louisville has been a major player in the award-winning Partnership for a Green City with Jefferson County Public Schools and Louisville Metro government. The university has launched the Signature Partnership Initiative, an effort to improve education, health care, social services and economic opportunity in a traditionally underserved area in west Louisville.

The University of Louisville's partnership with UPS has helped that company grow into the state's largest employer. Under Dr. Ramsey's leadership, a \$2.5 billion plan has been approved for expanding and building the Health Sciences Campus with new research, clinical, and educational facilities in a Downtown Research Park. As part of this initiative, UofL received approval for a \$350 million Tax Increment Financing (TIF) district from the state and Louisville Metro government.

When he began at UofL in 2002, Dr. Ramsey was given the mandate to continue to move the university forward with the implementation of the strategic plan: "The Challenge for Excellence - 1998-2008." With the successful completion of the "Challenge," the university has now stepped forward with a new strategic plan - "The 2020 Plan" - a blueprint that will guide the university through the milestone date set in the Postsecondary Education Reform Act of 1997.

At the same time, the university has begun its next major capital campaign and has undertaken a new branding effort - "It's Happening Here."

A strong commitment to serving the community and commonwealth is nothing new for Ramsey. Before assuming UofL's top post, he served as senior policy advisor and state budget director for the Commonwealth of Kentucky and senior professor of economics and public policy at UofL.

He also has held several other positions in state government, serving as interim commission of the Office of the New Economy and special advisor to the chairman of the Kentucky Council

on Postsecondary Education.

On the academic side, he has served as vice chancellor for finance and administration at both University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and Western Kentucky University. He has been associate dean, assistant dean and director of public administration in the College of Business Administration at Loyola University and a research associate for the University of Kentucky's Center for Public Affairs. He has served on the faculties of UNC, WKU, UK, Loyola University and Middle Tennessee State University.

A frequent national speaker and writer on economic issues in the public sector, Ramsey received the National Governors Association's Outstanding Public Service Award in 2001 and was named Kentucky's Distinguished Economist of the Year in 1999.

Business First newspaper named Ramsey Louisville's Business Leader of the Year in December 2007. In September 2008, the Volunteers of America of Kentucky awarded him its Volunteer Spirit Award for outstanding leadership and contributions to the community. Ramsey was recognized for the Cardinal Covenant, a program he founded to ensure Kentucky's low-income students could afford to attend the university, and for the Signature Partnership. And in 2010, he was named Louisvillian of the Year by the Advertising Federation of Louisville.

A Kentucky native, he holds a bachelor's degree in business administration from Western Kentucky University and master's and doctoral degrees in economics from UK.

Sharing his commitment to public service is his wife, Jane Ramsey, who is involved in a host of community activities and organizations. She heads an effort to beautify UofL's Belknap Campus and revitalize its surrounding South Louisville neighborhood. That effort is highlighted by the upcoming renovation of Stansbury Park, which borders the Belknap Campus. That Olmsted-designed park is being restored to its former glory thanks to partnerships among the university, Louisville Metro Government and the Olmsted Conservancy.

The Ramseys have two daughters. Jenny, an Auburn University graduate with a degree in Zoology, is a graduate of UofL's School of Nursing. Jacque graduated from the University of Louisville in 2009 and is now a professional in sports marketing.



## LOUISVILLE **ATHLETICS DIRECTOR**



TOM JURICH

Growth, innovation, achievement, excellence and a desire to stay on the cutting edge have been the trademarks of Tom Jurich's tenure as the Vice-President for Athletics at the University of Louisville for the last 13 years.

Jurich's unyielding desire to succeed has driven him to the pinnacle of college athletics and has put the University of Louisville on the national scene.

Since coming to the Derby City in 1997, Jurich has been the man behind the continued development of the university's entire athletic program, especially when it comes to building facilities.

Jurich's desire and vision for the University of Louisville has led the division to unprecedented development and accomplishment. For his efforts, he was selected as the Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal/Sports Business Daily Athletic Director of the Year in 2007.

From facilities to gender equity, from community involvement to national leadership, Jurich's actions prompted one state media outlet to recently write that "It all shows yet again that the hiring of Tom Jurich, the architect of this Louisville emergence, as U of L AD in the fall of 1997 stands as one of the most significant events in our state's modern sports history." After just eight years working his constructive efforts, he was inducted into the state of Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame in 2006.

Louisville took a dramatic step toward maintaining that upward trend by signing Jurich to an unprecedented contract extension in December of 2006 that will keep him with the Cardinals through 2023. U of L President Dr. James Ramsey enhanced Jurich's contract again in 2009. In an unprecedented appointment, he was named Vice President for Athletics at U of L in 2003.

Since Jurich was named Director of Athletics for the Cardinals on Oct. 21, 1997, there has been an unmatched flurry of activity on the U of L campus and Louisville area since his arrival.

Jurich continues to push U of L to the forefront of college athletics. While diligently working to keep the Cardinals on the cutting-edge nationally, Jurich has turned heads while quickly guiding major changes in the face of Cardinal Athletics. Academic success has risen dramatically during Jurich's watch as well.

The 2009 Big East Football All-Academic team had 14 members this year, and the department continues to strive to further develop academic success. In the fall of 2009, 275 of 514, including spirit groups, managers and trainers, recorded a grade point average of 3.0 or higher. A total of 281 student-athletes earned a 3.0 average or higher in the spring. A recorded 173 student-athletes were Red and Black Scholar-Athletes, who had GPA's of 3.25 or higher.

Jurich's high energy, community and family-minded approach has been contagious, infecting the university, city and U of L fans everywhere with a positive outlook for the future of Cardinal Athletics. It is a formula that has provided a trail of success in each situation Jurich has touched.

Jurich has been active in the scope of college athletics on a national level, within conference issues, and in his local community. He served three years as a member of the NCAA Management Council, one of the top legislative bodies of the NCAA, and the NCAA Division I Baseball Committee. He sits on the Board of Directors for Republic Bank and American Heart Association.

Jurich recently received the Louisvillian of the Year Award by the Louisville Advertising Federation and the Dan Mangeot Memorial Award, for contributions to the advancement of tourism and hospitality.

Guiding Colorado State University as its athletics director for the four years prior to his arrival at U of L, Jurich oversaw not only one of the most successful time periods in the school's history in terms of on-field competitiveness, but he was the driving force behind a successful capital campaign drive that included facility renovation.

Prior to his constructive efforts at Colorado State, Jurich operated as director of athletics for eight years at his alma mater, Northern Arizona University. When appointed at NAU, he was the youngest director of athletics at the NCAA Division I level at the age of 29.

He became athletic director at Northern Arizona in 1988, after previously serving as co-director (1986-88) and assistant director ('84-86). He was inducted to the NAU Sports Hall of Fame in 1989.

Jurich is among the finest football players in Northern Arizona history. A punter, placekicker and backup quarterback for the Lumberjacks, Jurich earned first-team Kodak All-America honors in 1977 — the first collegiate kicker to make the Kodak honor list — and also received All-America acclaim from The Sporting News. He is the only kicker in Big Sky Conference history to be named the league's offensive player of the year (1977).

A 10th-round NFL draft pick of the Pittsburgh Steelers, Jurich later played with the Minnesota Vikings before a brief coaching stint at the University of Minnesota.

He and his wife, Terrilynn, a former Miss Wyoming, have four children: sons Mark and Brian; and twin daughters, Haley and Lacey, who are playing field hockey at the University of Louisville. They also welcomed their first grandchild in May: Jay Ryan.



## LOUISVILLE HEAD COACH



CHARLIE STRONG

One of the most respected defensive minds in college football, Charlie Strong, a former defensive coordinator at the University of Florida, has been named the 21st head football coach at the University of Louisville. It gives Strong his long-awaited chance to become a head coach at the collegiate level.

"I've done a lot of homework with this hire, and I was amazed how well-respected and revered Charlie Strong is throughout the country," said Jurich. "He commands a lot of respect from people within the game, including ex-players and coaches around college football." Jurich added, "However, after meeting him in person, I was even more impressed. Tony Dungy had a huge impact on me with this hire. He was passionate about Charlie as a coach and as person. I respect the opinions of Urban Meyer, who was part of our staff at Colorado State, and Jeremy Foley, who is one of the most respected athletic directors in the country. They both raved about Charlie as a football coach and his great character."

Strong becomes the third African-American coach at a BCS school (Randy Shannon at Miami and Mike London at Virginia) and just the second-ever in the BIG EAST Conference.

Arguably one of the most revered defensive coaches in the country, Strong brings 27 years of collegiate coaching experience, two National Championships and 20 different appearances in bowl games to the sidelines at U of L.

He has also worked for three different head coaches who have won national championships in Florida's Urban Meyer, South Carolina's Steve Spurrier and former Notre Dame head coach Lou

Holtz. During his head tenure at Florida, he has coached 13 All-Americans, a National Defensive Player of the Year, a Jack Tatum Award winner, two SEC Defensive Freshmen of the Year, two Thorpe Award finalists, two Nagurski Trophy finalists and the 2008 Chevrolet Defensive Player of the Year. He has developed seven first-round NFL Draft picks and 18 players that were selected in the third round or higher. This year, cornerback Joe Haden was the seventh pick in the NFL Draft to the Cleveland Browns, while Carlos Dunlap, Brandon Spikes, Jermaine Cunningham and Major Wright were all selected in the first three rounds.

Strong comes to Louisville after spending seven seasons as the defensive coordinator at the University of Florida, including the last two as the Associate Head Coach. It was his fourth different stint at UF, having coached at Florida from 1991-94; 1988-89 and 1983-84. He served as Florida's interim head coach in 2004, falling to Miami 27-10 in the Peach Bowl.

In 2009, Strong guided one of the nation's top defensive units, finishing in the top five in four different statistical categories. UF was third in the nation in scoring defense (11.54 ppg), third in pass defense (151.46), fourth in total defense (253.08) and fifth in pass efficiency defense (93.91) in leading the Gators to a 12-1 record and a trip to the SEC Championship game for the third time in Strong's tenure as the defensive coordinator.

Five members of his 2009 defense earned first or second All-SEC accolades this season. Strong was named a finalist for the Frank Broyles Award, given to the nation's top assistant coach for the second straight year, and is the only second three-time finalist in the history of the award. Strong's defense in 2008 ranked in the top 20 nationally in 10 statistical categories, including a school-record tying 26 interceptions that also tied for the most in the country that season. UF's scoring defense showed the third-largest improvement from the 2007 season to the 2008 season, finishing fifth in the nation by yielding only 12.9 points per game.

His most impressive output of the season came in the 2009 FedEx BCS National Championship Game versus Oklahoma, who entered the contest with a nation's best 54.0 scoring average. The Gators held the highest-scoring offense in the history of college football and the Heisman-winning quarterback Sam Bradford to just 14 points and 363 total yards in Florida's 24-14 win to guide the Gators to their second national title in three years. For his outstanding work in 2008, Strong was named a finalist for the Broyles Award for the second time in his career. Strong also coached a group of linebackers that

included consensus first-team All-American and repeat first-team All-SEC performer Brandon Spikes, who was a finalist for the 2008 Bronko Nagurski Award.

In his seven years at UF as defensive coordinator, the Gators intercepted 131 passes, the third-highest total in the nation and the most in the SEC during the last seven seasons. A tenacious recruiter, Strong was named one of the nation's top-25 best recruiters by Rivals.com for his part in inking the 2007 signing class that was ranked No. 1 by most outlets. He was also a vital part in helping Florida lead the SEC in rushing defense for the second straight season while surrendering only 103.3 yards per game, registering as the 10th-best nationally. In 2007, he also helped develop Spikes into a consensus first-team All-SEC selection.

It marked the first time since 1999 that a freshman or sophomore linebacker earned Coaches' First-Team All-SEC recognition. In 2006, Strong helped guide the Gator defense that limited opponents to a league best 72.5 rushing yards per game. That figure marked the second-lowest total in school history, and stood nearly 25 yards better than the next-best team in the SEC. The Gators' run defense ranked fifth nationally in 2006, while they rated sixth in the nation in total defense with an average of 255.4 yards per contest. Under Strong's watch, Florida set a BCS record for fewest yards allowed in their national title bout with Ohio State, yielding only 82 yards to better the previous record by 72.

Three members of the UF defense earned All-America recognition and six players received All-SEC honors in 2006. Since the 2003 season, Strong's defensive units have allowed an average of 17.6 points per game, which ranks ninth in the country over that span, have forced a mind-boggling 193 turnovers and an average of 308.6 yards per contest. From 1999-2002, Strong served as defensive coordinator at South Carolina, earning finalist honors for the Broyles Award in 2000. He guided the Gamecocks to a top-20 national ranking in total defense twice, while the 2000 squad ranked sixth in the country in scoring defense after yielding just 15.8 points per game. Strong also spent four seasons at Notre Dame, overseeing the defensive line on a defense that registered a single-season school-record 41.5 sacks in 1997.

A four-year letterwinner at the University of Central Arkansas, Strong was a three-time All-Conference selection in football and a two-time honoree in track. He is married to the former Victoria Lovallo, and the couple has two daughters, Hailee (12) and Hope (9), and one son, Tory (21).

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## LOUISVILLE **SEASON REVIEW**



No one knew what to expect when head coach Charlie Strong took over for his first season, especially when the Cardinals opened with a disappointing 23-16 loss at home to Kentucky.

Louisville started slow, but dominated the second half, but still fell short. While the Cardinals fell to their long-time rivals, there were signs that the program was about to turn the corner. Picking up its first win of the season versus Eastern Kentucky, there were still many questions still to be determined.

However, many of those questions were answered the following week in a 35-28 loss to an explosive Oregon State squad. Trailing 35-

14, the Cardinals rallied back to within 35-28 and had a couple of possession to knot the score, but Louisville fell short. In the loss, the Cardinals garnered confidence that seemed to carry the team the rest of the way.

Louisville picked up back-to-back wins over Arkansas State and Memphis get to 3-2. Louisville opened BIG EAST play by allowing big plays in a tough 35-27 loss to Cincinnati. Louisville went on to record its first shutout in league play when it blanked Connecticut 26-0 at home. Louisville dropped a 20-3 loss at Pittsburgh, but responded with a 28-20 win at Syracuse despite losing its starting quarterback Adam Froman and



leading rusher Bilal Powell. The loss snapped the Cardinals' 11-game road league losing streak behind 98 yards from Jeremy Wright.

At 5-4, the Cardinals had three games left to get bowl eligible with consecutive home games versus South Florida and West Virginia. Louisville dropped a 24-21 overtime loss to South Florida when the Cardinals were stopped on fourth and one on their first possession in overtime. The following week, the Cardinals were stymied by relentless West Virginia defense that held the Cardinals to 26 yards rushing in a 17-10 loss. With a game at Rutgers, they had one more chance to get bowl eligible.

Louisville dominated the Scarlet Knights 40-13 behind three touchdowns from Powell and nine sacks from the Louisville defense to become bowl eligible. Senior Johnny Patrick notched a pair of interceptions, including one for a touchdown.

The Cardinals rebounded from a 4-8 season in 2009 behind 1,330 yards from Powell and an aggressive defense. Powell heads into post-season play ranking 10th nationally in rushing. He has seven 100-yard games this season and 10 rushing scores. Louisville's defense ranks 12th in total defense and five in the country in sacks. Red-shirt freshman Hakeem Smith leads the Cardinals in tackles with 80.

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## CONFERENCE USA

After marking its 15-year milestone during the 2009-10 season, Conference USA is still going strong. From the beginning, dedication to excellence has been the league's guiding principle and remains today a common thread for a promising future. C-USA is home to 12 nationally prominent, tradition-rich members in East Carolina, Houston, Marshall, Memphis, Rice, SMU, Southern Miss, Tulane, Tulsa, UAB, UCF and UTEP. This combination enhances men's and women's programs that are immersed in athletic success and academic prowess. Together, we are committed to excellence, integrity and leadership in athletics, academics and in our communities.

All C-USA institutions sponsor Division I-A football, along with several other men's and women's athletic programs, many of which compete regularly for NCAA Championships. C-USA sponsors competition in 20 sports - nine for men (baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, soccer, tennis and indoor and outdoor track and field) and 11 for women (basketball, cross country, golf, rowing, softball, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field and volleyball).

The league sponsors numerous academic awards, including the Commissioner's Honor Roll and the Commissioner's Academic Medal, indicative of outstanding achievement in the classroom.

C-USA annually awards 12 postgraduate scholarships, along with the Sport Academic Award, Scholar Athletes of the Year and the Institutional Academic Excellence Award. Conference USA also added a Spirit of Service Award, recognizing student-athletes three times a year for a combination of significant community service efforts, good academic standing and participation in their elected sport.

### SUCCESS OFF THE FIELD

C-USA institutions are among the nation's best in academic performance among student-athletes, bolstered by the fact that student-athletes at league schools have a higher graduation rate than the general

student population. Among C-USA's 5,000 student-athletes, there are champions off the playing field as well. In 15 years, 153 student-athletes earned national ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America honors, while 541 were named All-District. In addition, more than 20,000 student-athletes have been named to the Commissioner's Honor Roll or received the Commissioner's Academic Medal, indicative of outstanding achievement in the classroom.

### C-USA ON TV

C-USA enjoys significant television exposure through its partnerships with ESPN Inc. and CBS College Sports Television Networks. The league entered into long-term agreements with both ESPN and CBS College Sports, which, combined, provides C-USA with significant national and regional exposure for football, men's and women's basketball, and all other conference sports. Additionally, the CBS College Sports agreement includes video-on-demand, Internet, broadband, national over-the-air and satellite radio, and wireless distribution as well as corporate marketing rights, and website production through CBS Interactive. The agreement with ESPN extends the conference's current regular season football package to include the broadcast of the conference's Football Championship Game. It also encompasses distribution of men's basketball and women's basketball on ESPN/ESPN2 and both tournament championship games.

### C-USA IN THE COMMUNITY

The conference's footprint is concentrated with 12 members in nine states and a combined area population of nearly 17 million. More than 1.1 million living alumni represent C-USA schools across the nation. With a renewed commitment to community involvement, the conference has begun development of several initiatives to maintain strong ties in C-USA cities, as well as with fans and alumni across the country. C-USA schools also place a priority on giving back to their communities through volunteer service with local and national organizations.

### GOVERNANCE

Along with the ACC, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and SEC, Conference USA is one of the seven conferences having significant representation in the NCAA governance structure. The Presidents of the member institutions serve as the league's Board of Directors. R. Gerald Turner of SMU currently serves as chair of the Board.

### A PROUD HISTORY; A PROMISING FUTURE

Conference USA was formed in 1995 and quickly emerged as one of the nation's top conferences. The conference unveiled its name, logo and commissioner on April 24, 1995 in Chicago. The league's charter members included Charlotte, Cincinnati, DePaul, Houston, Louisville, Marquette, Memphis, Saint Louis, Southern Miss, Tulane, UAB and USF. Eleven of the institutions began athletic participation in 1995, while Houston joined competition in the fall of 1996.

The league's headquarters were established in Chicago and after nine years, relocated to the current office in Irving, Texas. Britton Banowsky was named Commissioner in October 2002, succeeding Mike Slive, the league's first commissioner.

C-USA added East Carolina (September, 1996) and the United States Military Academy (March, 1997) as football members. ECU began league competition in 1997; Army in 1998 and UAB began football play in 1999. The league added TCU and ECU (1999) for all sports and they began competition in 2001. USF started C-USA football in 2003.

After celebrating its 10th Anniversary during the 2004-05 season, C-USA began a new chapter in 2005-06 when its current membership came together to form the new look of the league.

Since its formation, C-USA has established a strong foundation, an identity and a history that reflects the league's national presence. Fifteen years of remarkable history has reinforced the league's position in collegiate athletics, setting the course for the next decade and beyond.

## SOUTHERN MISSISSIPPI **PRESIDENT**



DR. MARTHA D. SAUNDERS

At Southern Miss, we have always believed in ourselves and the promise of the future says President Martha D. Saunders, the ninth president of The University of Southern Mississippi.

"Southern Miss is a place that has always and will continue to meet, head on, the intellectual and human issues of the day," she says. "I believe the forces of innovation that make Southern Miss, Southern Miss, are much the same as those that make Mississippi, Mississippi, and the Gulf South, the Gulf South.

"There is a spirit of humanity here, as evidenced in our resourceful response to Hurricane Katrina, and more recently, to the Deepwater Horizon Oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico."

After becoming president on May 21, 2007, Saunders set to work building a plan for the future of the university through a widely inclusive strategic planning process involving faculty, staff, students and alumni.

Four strategic goals emerged from the process including (1) a climate for academic success, (2) an enhanced national image, (3) stronger connections with the community and (4) a culture of healthy minds, bodies and campuses.

Dr. Saunders came to Southern Miss from the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater, where she served as its first-ever female Chancellor. Prior to her appointment at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater, she was vice president for academic affairs at Columbus State University in Columbus, Georgia.

She previously held the position of Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at the University of West Florida (UWF), where she earned the rank of tenured professor of communication. At UWF, she also worked as Director of the University Honors Program.

Throughout her 30-year career in higher education, Dr. Saunders has taught thousands of students. Her philosophy of education follows three simple guiding principles: know your students, connect them to bigger things and set a good example.

Dr. Saunders' training and experience in the field of communication led to numerous publications on crisis communication and public relations; widely anthologized published speeches; and the Public Relations Society of America's highest national award for the "Just 2 It!" public safety communication campaign.

A native of Mississippi, Dr. Saunders earned her B.A. in French from The University of Southern Mississippi in Hattiesburg; her M.A. in Journalism from the University of Georgia in Athens; and her Ph.D. in Communication Theory and Research from Florida State University in Tallahassee.



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## SOUTHERN MISSISSIPPI ATHLETICS DIRECTOR



RICHARD GIANNINI

Since Richard Giannini was named Director of Athletics in 1999, his vision, leadership and unwavering work ethic has transformed the face and landscape of Southern Miss athletics that will have lasting effects for years to come.

In fact, to see the impact he has made on Golden Eagle Athletics, one need only look at all the improvements that have been made during his tenure, especially in the areas of academics, facilities, athletic achievement and increased revenue.

A tireless and innovative administrator, Giannini brought outstanding intercollegiate athletic experience to Hattiesburg, including five years as director of athletics at Louisiana-Monroe.

While working for the NCAA in the mid-1970s, Giannini's responsibilities included serving as executive producer of the ABC Football Highlight Shows, as well as NCAA Tournament basketball games not aired by NBC.

He also arranged and produced the first national telecast of the College Baseball World Series for HBO, and produced numerous conference football highlight films. He was also director of licensing for the NCAA.

He served as assistant sports information director at Florida (his alma mater) from 1966 to 1970, was sports information director at Duke from 1970 to 1973, became assistant athletics director at Duke in 1974, and, after working for the NCAA in 1976 and 1977, returned to Florida as senior associate athletics director to oversee external affairs.



He left Florida in 1986 to enter the private sector, taking over as CEO

and co-owner of Raycom Management Group in Charlotte, N.C., a subsidiary of Raycom Sports, where he developed numerous sporting events, including the Blockbuster Bowl, the most successful first-year bowl in NCAA history.

Giannini's successes have not gone unnoticed. He was inducted into the University of Florida's College of Health and Human Performance Hall of Fame in March of 2004 and the Saint Leo University Athletics Hall of Fame in February of 2005. The Golden Eagle athletics director was a track athlete, competing in the weight events, at St. Leo and Furman; and graduated from the University of Florida in 1966.

He has served on several Conference USA committees and currently is the chairman of the Football and Scheduling Committees. He was chairman of the C-USA athletic director's committee in 2001-02 and 2008-09. He recently completed a term on the NCAA Championships Cabinet and is serving his St. Leo and Furman four-year term on the NCAA Football Issues Committee, which governs all bowl games and has one of the longest tenures of any athletic director. He served as its chairman two years from 2006-08. He also represented C-USA Athletics Directors BCS meetings for a four-year period.

Giannini and his wife, Gayle, are parents of four daughters—Ansley Stone, Brittney Borbash, Carlyn Linker, and DeLancey, and grandparents of Tori, Parker, Sara, Kelsey, Ryleigh, Kyle and Avery.



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## SOUTHERN MISSISSIPPI HEAD COACH



LARRY FEDORA

When Larry Fedora accepted the job to become the 18th head coach at the University of Southern Mississippi, he promised that his football team would "attack" in all phases of the game.

That is exactly what the Golden Eagles have done during his three seasons as the program's mentor.

In his first year in Hattiesburg, Fedora's squad broke 36 school records on the way to ending the season with a five-game winning streak to reach a bowl game. The Golden Eagles extended that streak in 2009 to eight games - the longest consecutive winning streak for the program since the 1958-59 seasons - and in the process through the course of the season kept several program streaks intact during the season.

The Fedora era has drawn record crowds. The 2009 opener against Alcorn State set a stadium record for attendance with 36,232 and the overall mark for the year was 184,178. The Golden Eagles averaged over 30,000 fans for the second straight year with 30,696 in 2009 and broke their own record of 30,079 set in 2008. In 2010, the Golden Eagles averaged 29,400.

The Golden Eagles have become an offensive juggernaut during Fedora's tenure and again did not disappoint in 2010. In 2008, one of the school records they established was most total offensive yards

with 5,636. They came close to breaking that record again in 2009 with 5,413 yards of total offense. In 2010, the team is on the cusp of breaking the school record, gaining 5,498 during the regular season.

The Golden Eagles finished 31st in the nation in total offense in 2009, after finishing No. 20 the year before - the highest finish for the Golden Eagles since becoming a member of the FBS.

Southern Miss, known for its defense over the years, has seen a return to the "Nasty Bunch" style of days gone by. The "Nasty Bunch" defense was given to those Golden Eagle defenses back in the late-70s and early 1980s for its stingy style and given the name by then former defensive coordinator and later head coach, Jim Carmody. The Golden Eagles have forced turnovers in 35 of 38 games during the Fedora era and two or more in 26 contests. That turnover margin helped the Golden Eagles rank No. 10 in turnover margin nationally for the second consecutive year in 2009.

In 2010, the Golden Eagles had 20 players be cited by Conference USA for their play, including first team performers Cameron Zipp, Johdrick Morris and Danny Hrapmann.

The successes for Fedora for his program have not been limited to just the field. The school was one of 39 FBS institutions in 2009 recognized for its Graduation Success Rate (GSR) by the American Football Coaches Association. The Golden Eagles achieved a rate of better than 90 percent to go along with Notre Dame and Miami - both at 100 percent - as well as Alabama, Boston College, Connecticut, Duke, Navy, Northwestern, Penn State and Rice.

The Southern Miss job has been Fedora's first head coaching assignment after excelling on the collegiate ranks as an assistant.

Fedora came to Southern Miss after spending the three previous seasons as the offensive coordinator at Oklahoma State where the Cowboys have been in the top 10 in rushing yards per game and in the top 20 in total offense per game in each of the last two seasons.

During Fedora's three-year tenure at OSU,

the Cowboys raised their rushing, passing and total offensive yards each year that he was there. In 2006, the Cowboys were one of just two teams - the other being Boise State - to average over 200 yards both rushing and passing.

The OSU offense averaged over 30 points per contest over his final two seasons as well. The Cowboys made the biggest improvement in the country in scoring following his second season of running the offense, jumping from 96th nationally in 2005 to seventh in 2006.

Prior to his stint at Oklahoma State, Fedora spent three seasons at Florida where he served in the role of run game coordinator in 2002, perimeter game coordinator in 2003 and offensive coordinator in 2004. He also coached the running backs and receivers during those three seasons.

In 2004, Fedora's Gators ranked first in the Southeastern Conference in six different categories including passing offense (271.1), total offense (426.9), 3rd-down conversion percentage (47.8), touchdown passes (29), pass attempts (407) and pass completions (243).

Before going to Florida, Fedora was the offensive coordinator at Middle Tennessee from 1999-2001. In three seasons at MTSU, Fedora's offense averaged 424 yards of total offense, 181 rushing yards and 31 points per game. With Fedora as their offensive coordinator, the Blue Raiders broke 43 school records over three seasons.

Fedora began his coaching career as a graduate assistant (1986) at Austin College. He then served as an assistant coach at Garland (Texas) High School from 1987-90. Fedora then got back into the collegiate ranks in 1991, serving as the tight ends, wide receivers and running backs coach at Baylor, where he stayed until 1996. He then spent two seasons (1997-98) at Air Force coaching the passing game and wide receivers.

As a player, Fedora was a wide receiver at Austin College (1981-84). He helped lead the Kangaroos to the NAIA championship in 1981. He earned academic All-American honors in 1983, and honorable mention All-American in both 1983 and 1984.

## SOUTHERN MISSISSIPPI SEASON REVIEW

The prevailing theme for the 2010 Southern Miss football season was overcoming adversity.

The Golden Eagles, despite finishing 8-4 overall and 5-3 in Conference USA's East Division which was good for a second-place tie, dealt with a slew of injuries throughout the season as well as going through a shooting of three teammates in an off-campus incident in mid-November.

The respective injuries of 22 players caused at least a combined 55 missed games. As a result, the Golden Eagles played seven true freshmen and 12 redshirt freshmen during the year.

Still, the Golden Eagles found a way to record their school-record tying, 17th-straight winning season and trip to its nine consecutive bowl game.

The Golden Eagle season started on a Thursday night with a disappointing loss at eventual Southeastern Conference East Division champion, South Carolina. The team, though, rebounded by going through the next three weeks against non-conference opponents with victories.

The squad then opened the home portion of the campaign with a 34-7 victory over reigning Southwestern Athletic Conference champion Prairie View and followed it with its third-straight home win over a Automatic Qualifying Conference school, the Big 12's Kansas, 31-16, before squeaking out a 13-12 win at Louisiana Tech. The game was sealed in the final minute on a long pass from Austin Davis to Kelvin Bolden to help the Eagles run out the clock.

Conference USA play began the following week with the Golden Eagles

taking a 41-16 decision over Marshall to win its fourth-straight contest. That streak ended there as East Carolina came to Carlisle-Faulkner Field at Roberts Stadium the following Saturday and erased a 20-point first-quarter deficit to rally to take a 44-43 decision. That was the first of two one-point losses for Southern Miss during the year.



A 205-yard rushing performance from freshman Kendrick Hardy the next week helped the Golden Eagles rebound with a 41-19 victory over Memphis at the Liberty Bowl. Following the team's off week, the squad returned home to face UAB and dropped its second one-point home contest. This one came in double overtime, at 50-49, which was the second overtime affair in the history of the 11-game series.

That loss seemed to energize this team, as they went on the road to first beat Tulane 46-30, as the defensive come up with a touchdown and a safety over the waning minutes to wrap up the win.

That setup the biggest win of the year for the program, a 31-21 triumph over eventual league champion and nationally ranked UCF in Orlando. It was the first win over a ranked foe for Southern Miss since the 2003 campaign and put the team back in the hunt for the divisional championship.

The UCF celebration was short-lived however, as later in the evening; three Southern Miss players – Martez Smith, Tim Green and Dedrick Jones - were shot in an off-campus incident. That stressful event led to a somber week as they hosted Houston for Senior Day at "The Rock."

With Smith, the lone senior from that group, being introduced prior to the game, the emotional Southern Miss squad went out to defeat the Cougars, 59-41, behind six total touchdowns from Davis.

Following that victory over UH, the Golden Eagles then had to contend with its final opponent of the regular season, the offensive-minded Tulsa. Neither team disappointed, but in the end the home squad won 56-50 to end Southern Miss' chances of a divisional crown.

Still, with what they had to overcome during the year, the Golden Eagles posted the most wins since the 2006 campaign and a spot against long-time rival Louisville in the school's first bowl game in the state of Florida since 1981.

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
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


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
